



Behind the Numbers

- Majority of challenged titles involved books addressing the lives, concerns and experiences of LGBTQIA+ persons, Black persons, Indigenous persons, or persons of color
- Organized efforts by political advocacy groups to censor entire categories of books from libraries based on subject matter or author
- Growing involvement of elected officials to use legislation to limit access to library books based on topic, genre, or viewpoint





How To Talk About Book Bans

Below are a set of talking points which should be customized to reflect your own voice. These can be tailored to talk about a specific book that is being challenged or used more generally to oppose book bans. The points can be used for writing a letter to your local school or library board, your state legislators and governor, or as the basis of your public comments given to any elected bodies. They can also be used to help you draft a letter to the editor of your local newspaper or in speaking with members of the media. All of these actions are important ways you can help have an impact on the issue of book bans.

Reading is a foundational skill, critical to future learning and to exercising our democratic freedoms.

We can trust individuals to make their own decisions about what they read and believe.

The Benefits of Giving Youth Access to a Wide Variety of Reading Materials

There are many important benefits of providing children and youth with a wide variety of developmentally appropriate reading materials books which reflect their personal life experiences, as well as the experiences, stories, and histories of others in and beyond their communities. Reading books that represent a range of perspectives promotes student achievement, enhances youth wellbeing, and contributes to community cohesion. Trusted adults, including teachers, school librarians, and public librarians work to provide access to high-quality reading materials and teach youth to read


