### Shital Shah Director of Strategic Partnerships, Office of the Secretary U.S. Department of Education



Prior to joining the Department, Shital was the Director of Philanthropic Engagement at the American Federation of Teachers and also served on the 2020 Biden-Harris Transition Team for the US Department of Education. While at the AFT, she cultivated and strengthened relationships with philanthropic and education industry partners to garner support for improving children's well-being, creating powerful learning, building teacher capacity, and fostering school and community collaboration. #### Robert Balfanz, Ph.D. Director, Everyone Graduates Center, Johns Hopkins University School of Education



Robert Balfanz, PhD, is a research professor at the Center for the Social Organization of Schools at Johns Hopkins University School of Education, where he is the director of the Everyone Graduates Center. He has published widely on secondary school reform, high school dropouts, early warning systems, chronic absenteeism, school climate, and instructional interventions in high-poverty schools. He focuses on translating research findings into effective school interventions. His work was featured in PBS Frontline's The Education of Omarina. Dr. Balfanz is the first recipient of the Alliance For

Excellent Education's Everyone a Graduate Award and the National Forum's to Accelerate Middle Grade Reform Joan Lipsitzs Lifetime Achievement award. In 2013 he was named a Champion for Change for African American Education by President Obama and he is also an education fellow for the Middle School Matters program at the George W. Bush Institute. He holds a B.A. in history from Johns Hopkins University and a PhD in education from the University of Chicago.

### Kate Cochran Managing Director, National Partnership for Student Success



Kate Cochran is a managing director of the National Partnership for Student Success. Prior to this role, Kate served as Chief of Staff and a founding team member at InnovateEDU, an organization focused on closing opportunity gaps in education through the development of innovative models and tools to serve, inform, and enhance teaching and learning. In this role, Kate managed organization-wide business operations and provided strategic guidance and project management support to organizational leadership across InnovateEDU's major projects including efforts to bring together diverse, and often

disparate, stakeholder groups to address some of education's most pressing challenges collaboratively. She played an integral role in the design and launch of a school network and afterschool program in Brooklyn, NY, as well as InnovateEDU's work to develop and operate an urban education fellowship and launch a community of practice to address talent and human capital challenges in K-12 education.
