




What is chronic absence?

Chronic absence is missing so much school for any reason that a student is academically at risk.

Chronic absence is defined as missing 10 percent or more of school for any reason.



Chronic absence is different from truancy (unexcused absences only) or average daily attendance (how many students show up to school each day).





Chronic absenteeism is a *leading* indicator and a *cause* of educational inequity



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


Why Does Attendance Every Day Matter for Young Learners

- > Students chronically absent in prek/K are more likely to be chronically absent in later grades and less likely to read and count proficiently by the end of third grade.
- > Chronic early absence is associated with declines in educational engagement, socialemotional development and executive functioning.
- > Economically challenged students are especially affected as they have less access to resources to make up for the lost opportunities to learn.
- A regular routine of attendance helps young children and their families become less anxious about school, connect to peers as well as teachers, access resources and Attendance engage in learning.

Our unprecedented attendance crisis now affects nearly 1 out of 3 students

Percentage of Students Chronically Absent Nearly Doubled Nationwide Between SY 2017-18 to SY 2021-22



- ✓ The number of chronically absent students grew from 8,095,132 to 14,660,261.
- ✓ Increases are occurring in tandem with significant drops in achievement.
- ✓ Chronic absence is higher than ever, especially in early elementary and high school.
- ✓ Early data from 2022–23 indicate rates remain high.








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WHY STUDENT ENGAGEMENT AND ATTENDANCE MATTERS TO MAYORS AND CITY LEADERS:



Stronger Economy: Good schools are key to creating a healthy and vibrant city that attracts businesses as well as new residents. Chronic absenteeism can undermine efforts to improve school performance and can contribute to higher dropout rates.



Better Schools: School quality is an important consideration for families thinking about where they will live. Students who feel safe in school, are engaged, and attend more regularly have better mental and physical health, higher test scores, and increased opportunities to achieve their dreams.



Safer Communities: Better attendance and engagement in school means safer safer streets in our cities. When students are in school, they are more likely to be in settings that support learning and nurture positive relationships with peers and adults while keeping them out of harm's way.

How Cities Can Support



- Increase public awareness & sustain public attention
 - Initiate media coverage
 - Assist with home visits
 - Issue proclamations
 - Public recognition of students
- Convene a broad set of partners
- Provide staff volunteers/mentors

- Partner on school and community events
- Assist with basic needs
 - Transportation
 - Healthcare, including vaccinations
- Scale programs by combining SLFRF, taxes, and other city funds


Why Engagement and Attendance Matters

The Attendance Imperative: Attending school regularly is essential to students gaining the academic and social skills they need to thrive. Chronic absence - defined as missing 10% of the academic year - has more than doubled since the start of the pandemic, from 8 million to an estimated 16 million students nationwide, and absenteeism is especially high among students and families most adversely impacted by the pandemic. Chronic absence, no matter its cause, has real life consequences for students, families, and society as a whole. Research shows that starting as early as preschool and kindergarten, chronic absence can leave third graders unable to read proficiently, sixth graders struggling with coursework, and high school students off track for graduation.




