Christine Bell, LMSW Executive Director Urban Neighborhood Initiatives Co-chair of Every School Day Counts Detroit

Christine Bell, LMSW is a community and youth development practitioner, teacher, and mentor with more than 20 years of experience, 18 of those years have been in Detroit neighborhoods. She currently serves as the Executive Director of Urban Neighborhood

Initiatives (UNI). She is the architect of 9 high-quality youth development programs including the Southwest Detroit Mural Arts Project, as well as a leader in efforts focused on education and youth-driven community development. Ms. Bell led UNI in collective impact efforts including co-founding Every School Day Counts Detroit, a multi-sector effort to decrease chronic absence. She is the co-chair of this effort. Emma Herdean leverages connections, resources, and research to provide attendance awareness, advocacy and assistance to the community, school administration, students, and families. She currently provides local attendance support to schools and community organizations in the city of Detroit, helping to increase academic and life-long success. Emma's knowledge and experience with non-profit organizations, family literacy programs, schools, and community partnerships in the last fifteen years have been instrumental for the current work of improving school attendance.

Emma led to the implementation of family literacy programs through partnerships with community-based organizations and with both Detroit Public Schools Community district (DPSCD) and various charter districts for over a decade. Executive Director, Brightmoor Alliance Pastor, Baber Memorial A.M.E. Church Co-chair of Every School Day Counts Detroit

Rev. Simmons is a born-again Christian, joyfully married to Betty Simmons. They have a blended family of eight sons. Rev. Simmons is a graduate of Detroit Public Schools, (Central) Wayne State University

with a degree in Computer Science, and Washtenaw Community College with a degree in Applied Technologies.

Young, Chief Information Officer/Director of Strategic Planning for Wayne County, and executive positions in human services.
