Kate Bennett

Community Impact Officer, Early Childhood Success & Education Success, United Way of Central Iowa

Kate began her career at United Way of Central Iowa in 2002 as the Executive Director for Polk County Early Childhood Iowa. In that position, Kate worked to create a collaborative system for government and local nonprofits to support at-risk children from ages 0-8 and their families. The outcome of that work was a much more collaborative system and higher quality early childhood services in central Iowa.

Kate has served as the Community Impact Officer, Education Success since 2012. She spearheaded the 2020 goals to raise the graduation rate in Polk, Dallas, and Warren counties from 83.4% in 2008 to 93.6% in 2019. This increase of 10.2% means 6,300 more students graduated opposed to if the graduation rate remained at the 2008 statistic. For the last two years, Kate has been a part of the team who created the United to Thrive framework, which UWCI officially launched in May 2021. This framework maintains a strong education focus while looking through an equity lens and COVID recovery. Kate is the staff lead for two volunteer cabinets who guide this work: Early Childhood Success and Education Success. Kate is looking forward to this next exciting chapter in central lowa.

Community Impact Services Director, United Way of Central Iowa

Marian began her career at United Way of Central Iowa in 2016 as a Research Associate and Data Lead for Education. In that position, Marian worked closely with Kate and Cheryl providing data and helping to tell the story of United Way's work in education. Marian now leads the team responsible for the research, data, and investment process of UWCI. She

has been a part of the team who created the United to Thrive framework, and with her current team works within all Five Elements of a thriving community. Marian looks forward to the work ahead in United Way's effort to deepen understanding of the facets of United to Thrive, with the aim to identify new and multiple ways of measuring impact to demonstrate thriving.



Mary Sellers
President, United Way of Central Iowa

Mary Sellers was named President of United Way of Central Iowa in July 2021, a role she also held from 2012 to 2017. During the interim period of 2017 to 2019, Sellers served as U.S. President of United Way Worldwide, leading the U.S. network of 1,200 local United Ways. Mary was accountable for \$3.5 billion in fundraising revenue annually and the strategic impact of United Ways in 41 countries and territories. For 10

years prior to her leadership of United Way, Mary was the president and CEO of the Science Center of Iowa, where she guided the planning, fundraising, execution, and operation of the \$62-million, 110,000-squarefoot facility in downtown Des Moines. Mary earned her B.A. degree from the University of Florida and her M.B.A. at the University of Iowa, Tippie School of Management. She is also a graduate of the Getty Leadership Institute, the Strategic Perspectives in Nonprofit Management program at the Harvard University Graduate School of Business, and the Diversity Leaders Initiative at Furman University.



John Spinks Jr.
Project Manager, Oakridge Neighborhood

John Spinks Jr. is Project Manager with Oakridge Neighborhood, managing its 21st Century Community Learning Center. The Center provides a much-needed source of support to youth in the community through a continuum of after-school and out-of-school programming focusing on the academic, social, emotional and enrichment needs of students from kindergarten through 12th grade. John joined Oakridge Neighborhood in 2012 as community/Des Moines Public Schools

liaison. He previously served at Children & Families of Iowa and Orchard Place/PACE.

A native of Fort Meade, Florida, John attended Highland Community College and Drake University. He holds an Associates of Arts degree in criminal justice and a Bachelor of Science in Education. He serves on Iowa's Disproportionate Minority Contact committee. John believes the most meaningful aspect of his work is seeing youth in Oakridge Neighborhood programs graduate high school and become successful in the community with college and work.

Formerly Communications Manager for Planned Parenthood of the Heartland in Des Moines, Stone oversaw communications, strategy development and legislative advocacy for Iowa, Nebraska, Arkansas, and Oklahoma. Prior to his work at Planned Parenthood of the Heartland, Stone worked as the Director of Grassroots Development and Field Director for Iowans for Sensible Priorities, the federal budget campaign led by Ben Cohen, co-founder of Ben & Jerry's Ice Cream. Stone has also served as District Organizer for congressional candidate Paul Johnson and Field Volunteer Coordinator for presidential candidate Howard Dean.

Stone holds a Master of Public Administration from Drake University in Des Moines and a Bachelor of Political Science from Iowa State University in Ames. He was recognized as a Des Moines Business Record 40 Under 40 in 2021 and is a 2016 Greater Des Moines Leadership Institute alum.

In addition to his professional roles, Stone is a local artist in central lowa primarily focusing on long-exposure photography, nightscapes and astrophotography using a telescope and camera. His work, *Silos*, was honored with a 2016 lowa State Fair Photography Salon Honorable Mention ribbon.
