consulting practice that helped educational initiatives develop plans for scaling and sustainability.



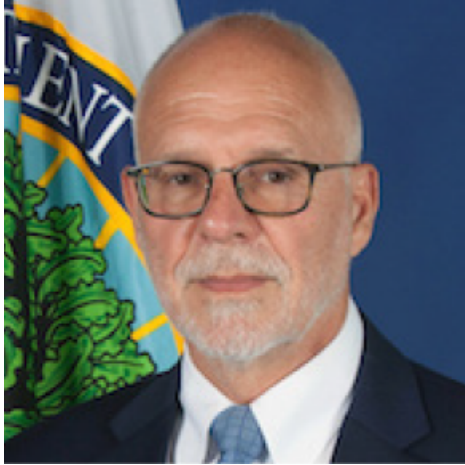
Erin Mote
Executive Director and Co-Founder, InnovateEDU

Erin Mote is the Executive Director and Co-Founder of InnovateEDU. An enterprise architect, she created, alongside her team, two of InnovateEDU's signature technology products - Cortex, a next-generation personalized learning platform, and Landing Zone - a cutting-edge infrastructure as a service data product. Erin is also the co-founder of Brooklyn Laboratory Charter School with her husband Dr. Eric Tucker. She is a recognized leader in technology, mobile, and broadband and has spent much of her career focused on expanding access to technology in the US and abroad. She has served in an advisory capacity to the White House/OSTP's US Ignite Initiative, the Obama Administration's Global Development Innovation Policy, the State Department's TechCamp program, and the Obama Administration's intra-agency process for Rio 2.0 and Rio+20. Erin served as the founding Chief of Party for the USAID Global Broadband and Innovations Alliance – a \$19.5 million global technology expansion project. A recognized leader in alliance building, Erin serves in an advisory capacity for several leading international organizations including Digital Promise, SXSWedu Launch, XPrize, and the Barbara Bush Foundation. She is an Aspen Institute Socrates scholar and a proud alumna of the University of Michigan.

Deborah Peart is the founder of My Mathematical Mind and speaks on a variety of topics related to math identity, elementary math content and instruction, and literacy connections to mathematics. Blending her training in yoga and mindfulness with mathematics instruction, Deborah advocates for a mindful approach to teaching mathematics in order to address math anxiety, build confidence, and support the development of positive math identities. She has dedicated her career to supporting educators with innovative teaching strategies that allow students to see themselves as assets to the learning community and curious problem-solvers. She is a math content specialist at UnboundEd and the lead author for second grade for the Illustrative Mathematics K-5 curriculum. Deborah believes that all children deserve high quality instruction and the opportunity to become competent readers, writers, and mathers.



Mark Schneider
Director, Institute of Education Sciences

Before joining IES, Mark Schneider was a vice president and an Institute Fellow at American Institutes for Research (AIR) and President of College Measures. Prior to joining AIR, Dr. Schneider served as Commissioner of the National Center for Education Statistics from 2005–2008. In 2013, the *Chronicle of Higher Education* selected him as one of the 10 people who had the most impact on higher education policy that year. He is the author of numerous articles and books on education policy. His most recent

book, *The University Next Door*, edited with KC Deane, was published in 2014 by Teachers College, Columbia University. Other books include *Getting to Graduation*, edited with Andrew Kelly, published in 2012 by Johns Hopkins University Press and *Higher Education Accountability*, edited with Kevin Carey, published by Palgrave in 2010; *Charter Schools: Hope or Hype?* written with Jack Buckley, was published by Princeton University Press in 2007. Schneider's 2000 book, *Choosing Schools*, also published by Princeton University Press, won the Policy Study Organization's Aaron Wildavsky Best Book Award. Dr. Schneider was a visiting scholar at the American Enterprise Institute and Distinguished Professor Emeritus of political science at the State University of New York, Stony Brook.
