Early and Elementary Learning Specialist June Harless Center Marshall University

Department of Education's Early and Elementary Learning Technical Assistance Center. She received a Bachelor of Arts in Elementary Education and a Master of Arts in Special Education and Autism from Marshall University. She also completed her Early Childhood Education certification and is currently working on her doctorate degree in Curriculum and Instruction.

After joining the June Harless Center and working as a graduate intern in a preschool classroom while earning her Master of Arts degree, Brittany went on to teach third grade and kindergarten for Cabell County Schools. She also taught summer school, the after-school tutoring program, and hosted an extra-curricular book club for primary students. She has served as a mentor teacher for teacher candidates at several universities and has provided professional development at the school, county, state, and national levels.

In her role as an Early and Elementary Learning Specialist, Brittany works with her team to help strengthen the learning opportunities for all children in the state of West Virginia by connecting stakeholders with research and resources. The aim of their work is to provide district, school, and classroom-level support statewide through providing resources and professional development to assist with the social, emotional, and academic for gaps for all pre-k through fifth grade students. Brittany serves as a coordinator for Dolly Parton's Imagination Library Program in West Virginia where she assists families throughout the registration process, develops book activity sheets and monthly newsletters to accompany the books children receive each month, works with local partners to build and sustain family engagement, and supports counties with increasing community support. She is passionate about creating a strong foundation in early childhood to assist students in becoming effective learners who will contribute to a better world.

Tarabeth Heineman, Ph.D. is the Executive Director for the June Harless Center (JHC) for Rural Educational Research and Development, a program of the College of Education and Professional Development at Marshall University. The Center was established in

2000 to provide leadership in educational initiatives with the primary goal of elevating educational opportunities for every child in West Virginia.

After joining the Harless team in the spring of 2005, Tarabeth has held various positions for the Center. Currently, Tarabeth leads a team of 18 staff members and 6 graduate assistants and directs the work of the JHC which focuses on early childhood education, early and elementary learning PreK-5, and STEAM education. She oversees an annual budget of approximately \$2.5 million which includes federal, state, and foundation funds. Under Tarabeth's direction, the JHC also manages Dolly Parton's Imagination Library for the state of West Virginia. This statewide initiative has been a part of JHC programming since 2019.

Tarabeth has participated in three study abroad tours to the world-renowned early childhood programs in Reggio Emilia, Italy. After collaborating with foundations and exploring other state funding opportunities, Dr. Heineman is working to support pre-service and in-service early childhood educators in the implementation of the Reggio-inspired approach. She completed her doctorate at Marshall University with a degree in Curriculum and Instruction in 2022.
