

We believe parents are the key to child success








Learning from research The power of coaching

83% of parents agree that good parenting can be learned... **69%** say that if they knew more positive parenting practices they would use them...

Evidence finds that the quality of early parent-child relationships **can be strengthened** and that children can be **motivators for behavior change** for adults

"Parent training interventions provided by coaches have been shown to increase responsive and developmentally stimulating parenting and, in turn, children's early achievement and positive social behavior." – Parenting Matters






Learning from research

A deeper dive into language coaching

In a study from University of Washington's I-LABS, short-term coaching improved parent language behaviors, which in turn influenced brain development and predicted later language achievement and trajectories

ParentCorps

SEL coaching for teachers, parents, and children →

50% fewer child mental health problems 24% more likely to read on grade level

Springboard Collaborative

Literacy coaching for parents and teachers → 3-4 months of reading growth in 5-10 weeks

Centering is the billable primary care visit





Centering patients take an active role in their own assessment learning more about their health and the importance of self-care and wellness

The result: collaborative partnership with their healthcare team





Each visit includes traditional 1:1 prenatal or pediatric health assessment, screenings, exams, tests, immunizations and oral health within the group space

Participants raise issues and explore solutions through facilitated discussions and engaging activities, resulting in better learning and understanding





The group environment is safe and inclusive; group members are encouraged to share from their own experiences, cultural beliefs and values

Centering* Healthcare Institute Centering moms have healthier babies, including a 33-47% reduced risk of preterm birth and a flattening of racial disparities


