Evaluation Study Findings

Among other positive outcomes, First 10 sites:

- Addressed barriers that limit families' access to school readiness services.
- Increased collaboration between Pre-K and Kindergarten teachers.
- Aligned Pre-K and Kindergarten practices.
- Raised awareness of the importance of early learning through Parenting Campaigns.
- Improved collaboration among schools, early childhood programs, and community partners



Current efforts

First 10 Schools and Communities Pilot

Funded through the PDG B-5 grant, the pilot supports implementation of First 10 strategies in seven communities through a competitive grant awarded to elementary schools working in collaboration with at least one community partner. The pilot evaluation will inform Maine's ongoing efforts to sustain and expand First 10 strategies in our schools and communities.










TIPS FOR READING WITH YOUR CHILD





Have a routine. Try to read together,

WARM UP, Check out the cover. Read the title. Look at pictures. Ask your child what they think the story is about.

CHANGE YOUR VOICE, Make the book extra interesting by trying different voices for different characters

PAUSE FOR NEW WORDS. Books are a great way to learn new words. Talk about words your child doesn't know.

ASK QUESTIONS THAT DON'T HAVE "YES" OR "NO"

ANSWERS, "What do you think will happen next?" or "Why
is this girl happy?" After asking, wait 5 seconds before
saying anything else to give your child time to think and
rescond.

TALK ABOUT FEELINGS. Point to a person in the book and ask, "How is he feeling?" When your child responds, ask if they have a guess about why.

MAKE PERSONAL CONNECTIONS, Look for story connections. For example, "Do you remember when we made soup? What did we put in ours?"

SWITCH ROLES, Pick a favorite book and have them "read" the story to you. They can describe what is happening in the pictures.

- Engage in post-visit reflection to ask questions, share inspiration etc.

For hosting teachers:

- · Welcome visitors warmly
- Continue with regular classroom activities
- Be open to questions and feedback
- Share resources or materials if appropriate


Goals


